

Safeguarding in Higher Education: Universities as Safe and Inclusive Spaces

About the Book

Safeguarding in Higher Education: Universities as Safe and Inclusive Spaces will be an international and interdisciplinary publication edited by Dr Gabriele Rosato and coordinated by the Institute of Anthropology (IADC) at the Pontifical Gregorian University. It is expected to be published by Springer as part of a new IADC book series.

This volume aims to redefine safeguarding as a cultural and ethical endeavour, extending beyond legal or procedural scope. The text proposes a multidisciplinary framework for reimagining universities as institutions that prioritise care, accountability, and human dignity. This approach addresses issues related to migration, religion, gender, colonial history, kinship, and memory.

Project Background

While universities are increasingly engaging in discussions about discrimination, inclusion, and mental health, there remains a glaring gap in awareness, language, and infrastructure surrounding safeguarding in higher education. This observation reflects societal demands for greater accountability and ethical governance within academic institutions, particularly in light of growing incidents of harassment, abuse, and discrimination among students, faculty, and staff.

Safeguarding policies are often inconsistent and are perceived as mere compliance requirements. This fragmentation hinders the development of a cohesive approach that can effectively address the diverse needs of the university community, thereby compromising the overall integrity of educational environments.

Rationale

Unlike primary or secondary schools, higher education institutions rarely adopt systemic safeguarding frameworks. Universities are both powerful institutions and delicate ecosystems: environments where unresolved trauma, institutional negligence, or misaligned policies can perpetuate harm rather than support healing.

This book addresses that blind spot by:

- Highlighting the ethical and political importance of safeguarding in academic life;
- Offering tools for designing inclusive institutions which respond adequately to

- sexual violence, harassment, and psychological harm;
- Creating trauma-informed learning environments to identify patterns of behaviour and prevent possible triggers;
- Bridging academic theory and real-world practice through international case studies;
- Integrating insights from anthropology, education, digital ethics, theology, psychology and psychiatry.

Target audience

This book is intended for a wide but clearly defined international readership:

- University administrators and leadership teams, seeking guidance on fostering ethical and inclusive environments;
- Safeguarding officers and student support services, looking for trauma-informed tools and frameworks;
- Policy-makers and educational authorities, committed to reforming higher education through dignity- and justice-based principles;
- Faculty members, librarians, and curriculum developers, who shape student experience in daily, often invisible ways;
- Faith-based educational networks and mission-driven institutions aligned with carecentred values;
- Students, regardless of their background, who expect their universities to be safe spaces.

What the Book Will Contain

The volume will include three types of contributions:

- Theoretical chapters Exploring safeguarding through conceptual, cultural, and ethical lenses:
- Case studies and field scenarios Practical examples of implementation, innovation, or failure;
- Toolkits and applied frameworks Checklists, audit tools, pedagogical strategies, etc.

We particularly welcome contributions that explore safeguarding in higher education through intersections with:

- · Trauma and mental health;
- · Faith-based and religious institutions;
- Disability, race, and structural inequalities;

- · Digital environments and Al governance;
- Libraries, residential campuses and nonacademic spaces;
- Sexual harassment, power asymmetries, and institutional response;

The IADC considers the possibility of translating the book into other languages.

Examples of Topics

(not exhaustive)

Potential contributors might propose chapters on:

- Is safeguarding a *Western* concept? Rethinking global applicability and critiques
- Safeguarding in theological faculties and religious training institutions
- Cybersecurity, AI, and algorithmic harm in academic systems
- Safeguarding failures and survivor experiences in higher education
- Training the next generation: safeguarding as a university subject
- Trauma-informed libraries and informal learning spaces
- Developing safeguarding procedures in multicultural campuses
- Faculty as bystanders, gatekeepers, or advocates
- Forced migration and displacement in higher education
- Case studies from Global South or underrepresented regions

If you are unsure whether your topic fits, we strongly encourage you to contact the editor to discuss your idea.

Format and Submission Guidelines

We invite expressions of interest in the form of:

- A proposed title (tentative)
- A short abstract (300-400 words)
- · A list of cited/relevant references
- · Indicate if your contribution will be:
 - □ Theoretical
 - □ Practice-based
 - □ Case study
 - □ Toolkit

Final chapters will generally be between 4,000 and 6,000 words: this will be confirmed or

amended once the selected contributions are determined. Collaborative pieces are welcome.
